


Public Art with Sonya Clark

inston's Public Art Trail reflects the city's cultural and musical heritage through murals, sculptures, and installations that celebrate its artistic legacy. It enhances community pride, social engagement, education, and emotional well-being. Public art projects rely on careful planning, grants, and donations. Supporting initiatives like the Community Council for the Arts ensure these creative expressions remain accessible and continue to enrich the community. One place to see public art is the "Heritage Arch" at Maplewood Cemetery, located at Queen Street and Shine Street. The archway was built out of steel with bronze leaves welded by Rose Clark.

When thoughtfully designed and curated, they offer a unique blend of history, memory, nature, and creativity. Cemeteries, when reimagined, become not just places of mourning- but of meaning. his year's Holiday Arts and Makers Market is proud to spotlight a beloved Kinston company: House of Morgan Pewter.


